# **Creative Writing (elective)**

# Grades 9-12, .5 Credit (one semester/trimester)

Course can be taken more than once (repeater course)

## **Course Description:**

Creative Writing courses offer students the opportunity to develop and improve their technique and individual style in poetry, short story, drama, essays, and other forms of prose. The emphasis of the courses is on writing; however, students may study exemplary representations and authors to obtain a fuller appreciation of the form and craft. Although most creative writing classes cover several expressive forms, others concentrate exclusively on one particular form (such as poetry or playwriting).

# **Course Goals/Essential Questions:**

- 1. To be exposed to a variety of genres, authors, and styles through reading, discussion and analysis
- 2. To experiment with a variety of writing genres, including but not limited to poetry, creative nonfiction, short fiction, and dramatic writing
- 3. To use the writing process of multiple drafts, revision, and editing in composing creative works
- 4. To hone and practice critical skills by giving and receiving criticism of own and others' writings
- 5. To create a portfolio of high quality creative writing pieces from each unit in the course
